

Tech Guy Abroad... The Beijing Auto Museum

On a recent trip to China I was able to make a brief visit the Beijing Auto Museum. It is located about an hour's drive from the Beijing Central Business District. It opened to the public on September 23, 2011 in a very impressive new building. The collection consists of about 70 vehicles displayed over five floors. Admission is only RMB 50 (about \$7.50) but I visited on a special day when seniors and children were allowed in free.

The displays are arranged along meandering pathways that direct the flow of visitors so you don't miss much. All of the exhibits had signs in both Chinese and English, although the English wording was sometimes difficult to understand and sometimes quite humorous.

Among the older pieces was a replica of the 1886 Benz and a scale model of the 1769 Cugnot that demonstrated how the steam pistons drove the wheel through a cog system. Going back even further is time there were copies of two Chinese vehicles from about 100 AD. One had a figure on it that always pointed south by means of gears attached to the wheels that rotated the figure as the cart turned. The other was a Drum Wagon that had wooden figures that, through a series of gears, would strike a drum about every 500 meters, the predecessor to the odometer.

Among the exhibits of European and United States cars was a 1925 Citroen that was driven in the 2007 Peking to Paris Rally. After the car reached Paris the Peugeot-Citroen group purchased the car and then donated it to the Beijing Auto Museum. Included were a curved dash Olds, Model T and Model A Fords, a Lincoln KB V-12, an XK120, a Rolls-Royce Silver Ghost, a Subaru 360 and a Dino 246 GTS.

There also were a large number of early Chinese cars, probably more that you will see in any other country. Starting with the Dongfeng CA-71, the first car produced in China (1958). This car was built by the First Automobile Works which became the parent of Hongqi (Red Flag) and is still producing cars today. The car on display is a replica as only 30 were produced (all hand-built) and the only original that still

exists is in the Hongqi factory museum.

The second car produced in China was the near identical Dong Fanghong. It was based on the Soviet Union GAZ Volga M21 from blueprints left behind by Soviet engineers;106 were built from 1959 to 1969.

They also had displays of the Shanghai SH760 and SH760B from the Shanghai

City Agricultural Machinery Manufacturing Company. This company also made tractors, just like Lamborghini!

Of interest were several of the early Hongqi luxury sedans used by Communist Party officials. The first-generation CA72 was based on a 1955 Chrysler; it was followed by the CA770 and the armored version CA772, and were powered by V8 engines although several of the cars displayed were missing the engines. There were also various Chinese jeeps and military trucks on view. Considering that all of these Chinese-manufactured vehicles were made in very small volume it is amazing that any even survive today and very few, if any, exist outside of China.

On the day I visited there were quite a few school groups there. The museum is well set up for children, with many interactive displays. There is also a restaurant and gift shop. The gift shop sold mostly model car kits for the children. The only thing I found with the museum's name on it were some car-shaped ball point pens.

So if you're ever in Beijing be sure to plan a visit the Beijing Automobile Museum.

This time they want to bring a new Stelvio, and also some bottled water to help with the warm September weather.


Of course we said it was fine with us, provided they also include another new Giulia as well! We might be able to talk them into some demo drives.

Our 2017 Summer Day Drive in late July was as close to perfect as any summer day in SoCal could be. Although the entrance to the Angeles National Forest was a busy spot, everyone arrived in time for the drivers meeting, successfully found their way along the route and were present and accounted-for at lunch. We had the 12 Alfas lead the pack (three GTVs, an Alfetta GT, a GTV6, five 1970s-1990s Spiders, Giulia Spider, Giulia Sprint GT) and five other nice sportscars (two Porsche 911s, Audi TT, Ford T-bird, Toyota MR2) were our back-up. No help was needed

from the more modern machinery though, thank you very much.

The short and sweet 31-mile that run took us up San Gabriel Canyon, Glendora Canyon, Glendora Ridge and Mt. Baldy roads was an old friend to some who live nearby; to others it was a window on a hidden world. "I've lived here all my life and I've never driven these roads!" declared one pleased Southern California native. Turn right, turn right, turn left, turn left.

We declared it an un-hurried,

civilized drive, and still there was time for a catch-up stop above San Gabriel Dam and a super group panorama photo-op atop Glendora Ridge where a light breeze lifted the spirits and carried away any remembrance of the hazy L.A. landscape below.

The region, full of oak glens, useful, versatile yucca on the hillsides, fertile plateaus and little creeks was heavily used by the Native American Gabrielino/ Tongva tribes and the traffic into the forest on this day

affirmed its popularity even now. Declared a National Monument in 2014, this part of the San Gabriel Mountains awaits further preservation status in the future.

Once parked in Mt. Baldy Village, we strolled the grounds of the local Angeles National Forest Mt. Baldy Visitor Center Interpretive Site, sipping the piney woods air and peeking into the replica sweat lodge, miner's cabin and modern-day native plant propagation greenhouse. Inside the park office, residing in the ca. 1949 Mt. Baldy Schoolhouse, a diorama held bighorn sheep, deer, raccoon, coyote, raptor and bobcat specimens. It also contained remnants of the schoolhouse built by area pioneer Bob Chapman.

Lunch was next on the itinerary and Mt. Baldy Lodge accommodated us handsomely at two long tables under cooling fans in the south side of the dining room. Excellent service, cold drinks, and satisfying dishes creatively named Fancy Tuna, Baldy Yacht Club, Jane's Favorite and Nanette's Great Grubber did not disappoint. We made sure to post in the positive on Yelp.

The main portion of the tour was concluded by about 2:30PM and we hopped off the mountain. A breakout group of about 13 in seven cars retired to the warmer latitudes to check out Rancho Santa Ana Botanic Garden, on the edge of the Claremont College campus. The property, founded as a native flora research and appreciation location in 1927 comprises 86 acres of the Azusa-area foothills. We navigated maybe a quarter of that space and were parched after two hours of

walking. It is impressive and there are many good works taking place here. Only a few of us had ever been there before, and we were glad to have made the time to investigate.




