Also, it's time for the annual AROSC election for members of your Board of Directors. You should see your ballots soon. See details on page 11.



TECH GUY ... In Pursuit of Trivia

In the current new normal of do-with-less, stay-at-home self-containment, people have had to fill the time with things that can be done at home. It has become the perfect time for that deferred maintenance on the Alfa or cleaning the garage and putting all the tools in their proper spot.

In my case, I decided that it's time to clean some automotive trivia out of my head. So here I go.

In 1969 General Motors began installing steering column locks as a federally mandated anti-theft device. The other manufacturers followed in 1970 when the law went into effect. However, Ford had a steering



column lock as factory equipment from 1932 through 1948.

The first use of caliper-style automotive disc brakes was on the 1950 Crosley Hot Shot. They were only available for six months and were withdrawn due to reliablity issues. The first mass-production use of disc brakes was on the 1955 Citroën DS..

One of the things that made the Ford flathead V8 so important is the fact that it was the first V8 engine with the crankcase and cylinders cast as a single unit. This greatly reduced manufacturing costs and allowed Ford to offer it in all of its models from 1932 on.

Alfa Romeo was the first manufacturer to use Variable Valve Timing (VVT) in production cars, as introduced in the 1980 Spider..

Henry Leland (1843-1932) was hired by the owners of the Henry Ford Company (after Ford was ousted) to help liquidate the company. He instead suggested reorganizing the company and producing a new car. The new company was called Cadillac. Cadillac was sold to General Motors in 1909 but Leland remained until 1917. Leland started a new company to build V12 Liberty aircraft engines. He called the company the Lincoln Motor Company. When the Lincoln Motor Company fell on hard times in 1922 it was bought by Henry Ford at a less than market-value price. Ford was still mad at Leland for his connection to Ford's first company

Carl Switzer (1927-1959) starred as Alfalfa in the "Our Gang" comedies from 1935 to 1940. In 1957 he was in the movie "Motorcycle Gang". He went from Our Gang to Motorcycle Gang; quite a range!

Albert Champion (1878-1927) formed the Albert Champion Company making spark plugs with the Champion name on them. In 1908, he left the company and started the Campion Ignition Company making spark plugs for General Motors. Sued by his former business partners, he changed the company name to AC Spark Plugs. He was also a French bicycle racer winning over 100 races in France and the United States.

The Fiat 124 engine was the first mass-produced engine to use a timing belt to drive twin camshafts. It was produced from 1966 to 2000. Different variants of the engine were used in Fiat, Lancia, Morgan FSO (Poland) and Alfa Romeo cars.

From 1952 to 1954, Fiat produced a car with a 70-degree 8V engine displacing 2 liters. Fiat called it the "8V" because they believed that Ford held the copyright to the term V8. They only produced 114 vehicles with this engine..

Società Pompe Iniezione Cassani & Affini (SPICA) was founded in 1932 to make fuel injection systems for diesel and gasoline engines. Alfa Romeo took control of the company in 1941 and made fuel injection systems for their engines (along with spark plugs, shock asbsorbers, oil pumps and other automotive parts). The founder of SPICA, Francesco Cassani, went on to found Società Accomandita Motori Endotermici (SAME) in 1942 making diesel and gasoline engines, and eventually manufacturing tractors. In 1973 SAME bought Lamborghini Trattori, forming a somewhat convoluted (and nebulous) connection between Alfa Romeo and Lamborghini.

I hope I was able to provide you with some not-so-useful facts that you might not have known. However, be advised to use these facts with caution. Some people have been known to get glazed eyes and lapse into comas when presented with such astounding information. -Gene Brown


