### **OFFICIAL NOTICE**

The membership meeting for amending the Bylaws will be held in conjunction with the Board of Directors meeting scheduled for April 8, 2023, at 11:00 AM.

You will be receiving an invite to a Zoom meeting from AROSC President Jim Barrett shortly before April 8<sup>th</sup>. Consistent with past practices, the new Bylaws can be approved by a 2/3 majority vote of the members present at that meeting.

The proposed Bylaws have the full support of the Board of Directors.

Even if you book rooms at other hotels, or show up the day of the events, you will not be able to participate in our tour or at restaurants due to limited space at




The trip is booked, but join the wait list.

Apricot Lane Farms is the shining example of one couple's 2011 experiment in biodynamic, regenerative farming. They repurposed a collection



of parched horse pastures into 243 acres of organic wonder. The founders are videographers - escapees from Hollywood - who created a documentary "The Biggest Little Farm" about their experience. unprecedented tie for the blue ribbon. Wow!







#### Subscribe Now!

Most human existence remained relatively uncomplicated for centuries. Then computers came along and made things easier for the untrained person to do. Then the internet came along and allowed people everywhere to communicate easily around the world. Add cell phone service, and now you can communicate wherever you are. But it's not only people that can communicate, those pesky computers can use the same methods to talk to other computers, without having to involve humans.

Automobiles have not been left out of the mix. For over a decade automobiles have been able to use the same networks to communicate. They can send you a text message or email to inform you of a problem or needed maintenance. Some cars are set up so that when maintenance is due, they inform the manufacturer, who then notifies your dealer so that they can call you to set up the appointment for that oil change.

Tesla started providing over the air software updates without even needing to involve the owner, similar to how your smart phone automatically updates. This has landed Tesla in hot water with the government by including safety changes in software updates, but failed to notify the government as required by law. No recall notice was issued, a silent

update simply took place.

The latest change in all this connectivity has to do with optional features. For decades when buying a new car you were able to select various options to be installed, and these options affected the manufacturing costs, and thus your final purchase price.

But now carmakers are installing certain options on all their cars, and then allowing for the feature to be activated by the buyer. This is done using the car's connectivity to the internet. The advantage is that all cars can be made with selected options, which make assembly easier, and at purchase the buyer can decide if they want the option enabled. The downside is that the price of the car goes up to cover the cost of the option even if the buyer is not going to use it. Additionally, there are various methods of paying for the option to be used. Manufacturers are offering three choices: pay a monthly subscription; pay a yearly subscription; buy it outright. If you are only leasing the

car, it may be less costly to get the subscription. But then the next owner has to decide if they want the feature. Also, with the subscription, the manufacturer gets a steady revenue stream. And if you choose to not activate the option the manufacturer can continue to pester you (and subsequent owners) to enable the option "at only a low monthly cost".

Some customers are pushing back at having to pay a fee to use an item that is already on the car and included in the purchase price. And yet, the increasing number of things in the marketplace that have these additional costs that people are getting used to it, especially the younger

generation who have little experience with paying only once for an item with no subscription.

In any case, there is no way to undo these "advances" in the marketplace and I guess those of a certain age will just have to get used to it. So, when you're looking at purchasing that new car, don't to forget to factor in the additional subscription costs: ignition switch enable, gas tank access, brake pedal enable, etc.


